The Order of Meditation and Prayer

It's Puzzling ∼ Luke 20:9-20

In the Parable of the Wicked Tenants Jesus warns against rejecting Himself, the Messiah. As we continue to reject Jesus as a society, believing that "all paths lead to heaven" or that there is no heaven or hell, we do it to our own peril. As the body, as God's children, we can't ignore this. God builds His Church on the crucified and resurrected Jesus. We are the means He uses to share this Good News of hope which is built on the one sure cornerstone, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

St. Paul's Ballot for Nominations

This ballot is used to recommend individual(s) within the congregation for a leadership position.

The process consists of:

- 1. Fill out the ballot with the name of the individual you are recommending and for what position within the St Paul's organization. Individuals being recommended are expected to currently be involved in Worship, the Lord's Supper, and Bible Study.
- 2. Turn the ballot in by way of the offering plate or return the ballot to the church office **NO LATER THAN MAY 1**.
- 3. The ballots are turned into the Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee will review the recommendations for the best ministry opportunity based on skills sets of the individual and the needs of the respective boards. Upon approval from the committee for a position, nominee will be contacted by a committee member to inform them that they have been chosen to be a candidate for a given office.
- 4. Nominees are asked to prayerfully consider the position. If they request additional information, the Nominating Committee will supply the duties of that position or that Board.
- 5. A follow up call is scheduled and the nominee is asked if they will accept the nomination.
- 6. If the nominee accepts the nomination their name is placed on the preliminary slate of candidates. This preliminary slate of candidates is presented in writing to the congregation (3) weeks before the upcoming Voters' Meeting. Additional names can be added up to (2) weeks prior the Voters' Meeting so that due diligence can be accomplished.
- 7. The final slate of nominees will be printed (1) week prior the Voters' Meeting.

No nominations will be accepted from the floor during the Voter's Meeting.

"Living as a Minority"

In modern America, Biblically faithful Christians and congregations are being viewed skeptically, marginalized, or even considered enemies of the state. Being a Biblically faithful Christian is increasingly a "minority position." How do we live faithfully in this environment? The book of *Acts* has a lot to say to us in this regard, for it records the beginning of the Church in the midst of the Roman Empire.

All early Christians left a "cultural majority" (whether Judaism or some form of paganism) because they were convinced that "Jesus is Lord." (Philippians 2:11) As Christians, they and their congregations had to learn to live faithfully as a minority in the midst of a sometimes hostile majority. That was their reality. Thus says the LORD, who makes a way in the sea, a path in the mighty waters, who brings forth chariot and horse, army and warrior; they they cannot rise, they lie down, extinguished, guenched like wick: "Remember not the former things, nor consider the things of old. Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith—that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, that by any means possible I may attain the resurrection from the dead. And he began to tell the people this parable: "A man planted a vineyard and let it out to tenants and went into another country for a long while. When the time came, he sent a servant to the tenants, so that they would give him some of the fruit of the vineyard. But the tenants beat him and sent him away empty-handed. And he sent another servant. But they also beat and treated him shamefully, and sent him away empty-handed. And he sent yet a third. This one also they wounded and cast out. Then the owner of the vineyard said, 'What shall I do? I will send my beloved son; perhaps they will respect him.' But when the tenants saw him, they said to themselves, 'This is the heir. Let us kill him, so that the inheritance may be ours.' And they threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. What then will the owner of the vineyard do to them? He will come and destroy those tenants and give the vineyard to others." When they heard this, they said, "Surely not!" But he looked directly at them and said, "What then is this that is written: The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone'? "Everyone who falls on that stone will be broken to pieces, and when it falls on anyone, it will crush him." The scribes and the chief priests sought to lay hands on him at that very hour, for they perceived that he had told this parable against them, but they feared the people. So they watched him and sent spies, who pretended to be sincere, that they might catch him in something he said, so as to deliver him up to the authority and jurisdiction of the governor.
