Today the good Lord has a good Word for those of us who have participated in a bortion. He forgives that. Gen 50:15-21; Rom 14:1-12; Matt 18:21-35

Don't Judge:

It's dangerous to judge. This is for the weak in faith.

Paul uses the example of dietary restrictions. There were some who had faith in Jesus when He said that all food is good. There were others who believed that Jesus was the Messiah, but their faith was weaker and they still followed the old dietary laws.

The lesson was that we don't judge another based on the strength of their faith.

Romans 14:1, "As for the one who is weak in faith, welcome him, but not to quarrel over opinions.

In whose timing is our faith strengthened?

How is faith fed?

John 13:35, "By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

Do Forgive:

Peter fosters many lessons from Jesus.

How often do we forgive someone?

Two points to our Gospel lesson.

1. A person is forgiven, so they forgive.

Do we earn forgiveness?

Are there people in your life that you need to forgive? If so, pray for the faith to forgive them.

2. The contrast between the amounts of the two debts.

When it seems impossible to forgive someone, think about the number of sins you have been forgiven for.

Through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, you have been forgiven a debt which is beyond all paying.



A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer

The 15th Sunday after Pentecost: *To Forgive or Not Forgive, That is the Question*

September 13-20, 2020

To Forgive or Not Forgive, That is the Question (Pastor Scharnell)

In settling His accounts with us, our Lord acts not with anger, but with compassion. He does not imprison us as we deserve, but He forgives all our debts and releases us (Matt. 18:23–27).

Therefore, our Lord bids each of us to have “mercy on your fellow servant” and “forgive your brother from your heart” (Matt. 18:33, 35). By the Lord’s forgiveness of our sins, we are free to forgive those who sin against us. Since we all will “stand before the judgment seat of God,” we are not to despise our brother (Rom. 14:10), but gladly forgive him.

The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Pray and confess out loud as much from the order of meditation and prayer as you are able, or as your family size and ages dictate. Learn by heart the verse, catechism, and hymn of the week.

Free to Live Thankfully (Pastor O'Donnell)

Through Isaiah the LORD reminds us that our ways, by nature, are not God's ways (Isaiah 55:8). He calls us to renounce our wickedness and to repent; that is, to "return to the Lord, that he may have compassion on [us] . . . for he will abundantly pardon." (Isaiah 55:7) He calls us to "let [our] manner of life be worthy of the gospel of Christ" (Philippians 1:27). That is, He calls us —unlike the grumbling day laborers in the Parable of the Laborers in the Vineyard (Matthew 20.1-16)—to recognize that whenever we enter the Kingdom of God—as a little child or later in life—our salvation is always a gift of God, and our service is a service of thankfulness to God.

THE FIFTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Genesis 50:15-21

When Joseph's brothers saw that their father was dead, they said, "It may be that Joseph will hate us and pay us back for all the evil that we did to him." So they sent a message to Joseph, saying, "Your father gave this command before he died, 'Say to Joseph, Please forgive the transgression of your brothers and their sin, because they did evil to you.' And now, please forgive the transgression of the servants of the God of your father." Joseph wept when they spoke to him. His brothers also came and fell down before him and said, "Behold, we are your servants." But Joseph said to them, "Do not fear, for am I in the place of God? As for you, you meant evil against me, but God meant it for good, to bring it about that many people should be kept alive, as they are today. So do not fear; I will provide for you and your little ones." Thus he comforted them and spoke kindly to them.

Romans 14:1-12

As for the one who is weak in faith, welcome him, but not to quarrel over opinions. One person believes he may eat anything, while the weak person eats only vegetables. Let not the one who eats despise the one who abstains, and let not the one who abstains pass judgment on the one who eats, for God has welcomed him. Who are you to pass judgment on the servant of another? It is before his own master that he stands or falls. And he will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make him stand. One person esteems one day as better than another, while another esteems all days alike. Each one should be fully convinced in his own mind. The one who observes the day, observes it in honor of the Lord. The one who eats, eats in honor of the Lord, since he gives thanks to God, while the one who abstains, abstains in honor of the Lord and gives thanks to God. For none of us lives to himself, and none of us dies to himself. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord. So then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, that he might be Lord both of the dead and of the living. Why do you pass judgment on your brother? Or you, why do you despise your brother? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God; for it is written, "As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall confess to God." So then each of us will give an account of himself to God.

St. Matthew 18:21-35

Peter came up and said to [Jesus], "Lord, how often will my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "I do not say to you seven times, but seventy times seven. "Therefore the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his servants. When he began to settle, one was brought to him who owed him ten thousand talents. And since he could not pay, his master ordered him to be sold, with his wife and children and all that he had, and payment to be made. So the servant fell on his knees, imploring him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' And out of pity for him, the master of that servant released him and forgave him the debt. But when that same servant went out, he found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii, and seizing him, he began to choke him, saying, 'Pay what you owe.' So his fellow servant fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' He refused and went and put him in prison until he should pay the debt. When his fellow servants saw what had taken place, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their master all that had taken place. Then his master summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. And should not you have had mercy on your fellow servant, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his master delivered him to the jailers, until he should pay all his debt. So also my heavenly Father will do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother from your heart."
