The Latest and Greatest in 4K and STEM

My name is Sofia Peppel, and I am the 4K homeroom teacher here at St. Paul's. Because 4K is a half day in the morning, I spend my afternoons teaching a wide variety of subjects and grade levels. I teach 5K-6th grade STEM, 7/8 grade Anatomy & Physiology, and 6th grade Spanish. It has been wonderful gaming all this experience and getting to know all the students!



With all this said, there is a lot happening in all the classes I teach! In 4K, we do a lot of centers. Centers are when students work in small groups. Centers help to improve critical thinking skills, problem solving strategies, and allow students to take part in a variety of different aspects. In this picture, you can see the students working on building their names.

When 4K had their Christmas Party, we did Christmas themed centers. For one of the centers, we played Christmas Bingo using M&M's! This was definitely a favorite. There was also stocking decorating, Christmas tree cup building, and snowball toss centers.





Students have been working on a variety of STEM projects during the last few weeks, such as building a free-standing Christmas tree using only paper and tape, turkey cage building, marshmallow snowflake building, and more. The bigger project that the 5th

and 6th graders had was to construct a marble maze. They applied their creativity and thinking strategies to this project which allowed them to come up with some pretty neat mazes. Take a look!

A Guide for Daily Meditation and Prayer St. Titus, Pastor and Confessor: *On the Sabbath Day He Went into the Synagogue* January 26 – February 2, 2025

On the Sabbath Day He Went into the Synagogue

The text emphasizes Jesus' habitual attendance at the synagogue, highlighting that despite his divine nature, he participated in weekly worship. The author questions why many people claiming to be connected to God neglect regular worship. The main reason given for Jesus' attendance is obedience to God's command to keep the Sabbath holy. Additionally, Jesus' presence in the synagogue helps establish a spiritual foundation for individuals and communities, illustrating his dedication to worship, prayer, and hearing the Word of God. We remember "for the joy of the LORD is your strength."




God Gives the Gift of a Child to Destroy Death and Topple Temptation (Ps. Schockman) The Lord opened the barren womb of Hannah and gave her the gift of the son for whom she prayed, and in grateful response she presented and gave the child, Samuel, to the Lord's service. *"As long as he lives, he is lent to the LORD"* (1 Sam. 1:28). So, too, did Mary and Joseph present the Child promised from the fall, born of a virgin's womb. The true offering wasn't the turtledoves or young pigeons. It was the Child they carried. This Child has come to *"destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and deliver all those who through fear of death were subject to lifelong slavery"* (Heb. 2:14b–15). Set free by His advent in our flesh and the promise of what He would do *"in the service of God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people"* (Heb. 2:17b), Simeon and Anna rejoiced. We also rejoice, for we, too, can face temptation and death unafraid and *"depart in peace"* (Luke 2:29) when our time comes.

St. Titus, Pastor and Confessor

First Reading: Acts 20:28-35

Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood. I know that after my departure fierce wolves will come in among you, not sparing the flock; and from among your own selves will arise men speaking twisted things, to draw away the disciples after them. Therefore be alert, remembering that for three years I did not cease night or day to admonish everyone with tears. And now I commend you to God and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up and to give you the inheritance among all those who are sanctified. I coveted no one's silver or gold or apparel. You yourselves know that these hands ministered to my necessities and to those who were with me. In all things I have shown you that by working hard in this way we must help the weak and remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he himself said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

Second Reading: Titus 1:1-9

Paul, a servant of God and an apostle of Jesus Christ, for the sake of the faith of God's elect and their knowledge of the truth, which accords with godliness, in hope of eternal life, which God, who never lies, promised before the ages began and at the proper time manifested in his word through the preaching with which I have been entrusted by the command of God our Savior;

To Titus, my true child in a common faith:

Grace and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Savior.

This is why I left you in Crete, so that you might put what remained into order, and appoint elders in every town as I directed you— if anyone is above reproach, the husband of one wife, and his children are believers and not open to the charge of debauchery or insubordination. For an overseer, as God's steward, must be above reproach. He must not be arrogant or quick-tempered or a drunkard or violent or greedy for gain, but hospitable, a lover of good, self-controlled, upright, holy, and disciplined. He must hold firm to the trustworthy word as taught, so that he may be able to give instruction in sound doctrine and also to rebuke those who contradict it.

Holy Gospel: Luke 4:16-30

[Jesus] came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up. And as was his custom, he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, and he stood up to read. And the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written,


"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me

to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind,

to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." And he rolled up the scroll and gave it back to the attendant and sat down. And the eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. And he began to say to them, "Today this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." And all spoke well of him and marveled at the gracious words that were coming from his mouth. And they said, "Is not this Joseph's son?" And he said to them, "Doubtless you will quote to me this proverb, 'Physician, heal yourself.' What we have heard you did at Capernaum, do here in your hometown as well." And he said, "Truly, I say to you, no prophet is acceptable in his hometown. But in truth, I tell you, there were many widows in Israel in the days of Elijah, when the heavens were shut up three years and six months, and a great famine came over all the land, and Elijah was sent to none of them but only to Zarephath, in the land of Sidon, to a woman who was a widow. And there were many lepers in Israel in the time of the prophet Elisha, and none of them was cleansed, but only Naaman the Syrian." When they heard these things, all in the synagogue were filled with wrath. And they rose up and drove him out of the town and brought him to the brow of the hill on which their town was built, so that they could throw him down the cliff. But passing through their midst, he went away.

In keeping with the Lord's instruction (cf. 1 Corinthians 11.17-34) and with the common historical practice of the church, St. Paul's welcomes only those who are in full confessional agreement to receive the Body and Blood of Christ. If you hold a confession differing from The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod or are not yet confirmed in our confession of faith, we welcome you to come forward for a blessing (Please indicate by folding your hands over your heart.). If you are physically unable to come forward, please let an usher know and the pastor will come to you and give you communion. Those communing should mark this on the attendance card. If you have questions, our pastors will be pleased to speak with you.

Distribution and Communion Wine

Please place open hands out to receive the Body of Christ and also to indicate whether you are receiving the Blood of Christ from the common cup or the individual cup. The wine glasses in the center of each tray contain one drop of communion wine. The glasses that contain more wine are dark in color.
