Soon, the real thing is coming, for Christ is risen. He is risen indeed, Alleluia!

The Architecture and Art of Hospitality

"Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God." (Romans 15:7, ESV)

There is something I want you to pray about. . .

This was cemented for me when I went to the hospital to visit Bob Bratz, whom I have come to love like an uncle in the faith. Bob's candor with me in moments of pastoral care over the years and his overall joviality made the reality of my last visit a cause for sadness, thankfulness, and conviction.

I walked into his hospital room on Holy Tuesday (15 April 2025). He smiled and said, "There's my man." As always: hospitable. I sat down across from him, and then things turned serious: "I'm going to lose part of my leg." Then we talked about that, and what it would mean for him in his living situation. Bob—I think for the first time in his life—was not going to be in Church for Easter, and he was in tears. We then talked, of course, about God's promises of forgiveness and resurrection. We talked about confidence in Christ, in life and in death. I then set the Lord's Supper before us so that Bob could receive the "medicine of immortality," the Body and Blood of Jesus, to forgive him and comfort him before he faced his life-altering surgery. [BTW, Bob gave me permission to repeat this for the Epistle.]

As I considered this faithful man, who loves the Lord and loves being with God's people and receiving God's gifts in worship, I thought also of many like him. I think of the late +Andy Rupnow+, disabled and under twenty-four-hour care, and his blessed mother, Karen, who barely fit in the little lift we have for them so they could be in church. I think of the several people and couples who, for various health reasons, cannot be active at St. Paul's—or who have taken their membership elsewhere—because of the difficulty entering our sanctuary. I think of several current members, who would love to be able to sing in the choir as long as they have a voice, but who know a hip replacement or knee replacement is coming—or who cannot have that surgery because of other issues—and who know that someday, sooner than later—they likely won't be able to go up to the balcony to sing.

I think of last year's strategic planning ("Why Discovery") discussions, leading up to our congregational picnic in July, and the absolutely central theme on worship. Our people love our beautiful sanctuary. They love being Lutherans. They love Law and Gospel preaching, Baptism, and the Lord's Supper. They love reverent and beautiful liturgical worship that celebrates the same. They love being in a room that is designed—in structure and art—to facilitate the reception of God's Word and Sacraments, a place for worship that is different than the world, that becomes a bridge of sorts between heaven and earth. Our people love artwork that

teaches the faith. They love the care that they have received from one another, and the care we show for our people in our community, especially in the Lord's Cupboard food pantry, food and help given not just to the needy, but given in Jesus' Name. They love the fellowship that is facilitated in various different ways: Advent and Lenten meals, the funeral lunches, the fundraisers and celebrations. They love Lutheran education, that Christ is in all things at St. Paul's school, from physical education to math. We live the Creed—the whole creed—at St. Paul's.

Our "Why Discovery" process led to four clear themes, four clear reasons people love St. Paul's. We love Lutheran: Worship, Education, Fellowship, and Care.

We have some general operations budget issues that we are working through. We're talking about it this Spring. But the congregation is growing. We'll figure this out. The Lord will provide.

So, keep this in your prayers, and begin to think about how we can make St. Paul's more accessible for worship, fellowship, education, and care. It's clear to me, and to the strategic ministry planning committee, and to many others, that—so help

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us, God!—it is time for us to build on the foundation bequeathed to us. It is time to invest in our strategic community location by making our facility more accessible, giving people easy and hospitable access to the sanctuary and—God-willing—the balcony, with handicap and child-friendly bathrooms on the sanctuary level. Our fellowship hall could also use expansion and improvement. It works fine for a school cafeteria, but our Sunday Bible class is approaching 100 people. All the support columns in there, and the acoustics, make it a challenging environment for a large class. Other gatherings in the fellowship hall regularly stretch our limitations. Of course, we could move the adult class to the gym, but having that open area unobstructed for the Sunday School opening and play is a way better use of the space, plus moving the adult class to the gym would require considerable weekly set-up and take-down.

It will take real sacrifice. It will also necessitate large gifts and bequests. But think about what it took for a congregation of largely German-speaking immigrants to build our current sanctuary *during World War I*. Think about ourselves and future generations. Think about what a more accessible facility for worship, education, fellowship, and care might look like.

Think about these things, and pray about these things. Many in the leadership are. The economy is a bit uncertain. That makes it a good time to pray and think and plan. God-willing, we'll have some options to present for consideration later this year at our 160th anniversary celebration.

Stewardship in the Body of Christ

Baseball season is upon us. The southern images of spring training give way to the pageantry of Opening Day. On that day, the hopes and dreams of every major league team, player and fan focus on doing whatever it takes to get to the Fall Classic, the World Series. Baseball is a secular way that so many of us confess that hope "springs" eternal.

With all of this in mind, baseball can also teach us a new perspective about stewardship. Think about the game itself. Baseball is a team sport. The home team faces off against the visitors. Yet while it is a team game, there are repetitive, individual confrontations that take place within the game. The baseball game cannot start without the individual pitcher against the hitter. Once the batted ball is in play, the battle is between the ability of the fielder against the speed of the baserunner. Once there is a runner on base, an attempt to steal a base, pits the runner against the catcher. A base hit into the outfield pits the outfielder against a runner trying to score.

Baseball is a team game with many smaller units at play. Without all those smaller units working together and achieving their tasks, the team will lose.

Romans 12 puts our stewardship of the Gospel in a similar setting. The church is certainly described as a team, if you will.

Verse 3: "For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned." This is where the Body of Christ is really seen as a team. No one member of the baseball team can win the game by themselves. In the same way, no one part of the Body of Christ can accomplish stewardship of the Gospel alone. The pastor cannot. The congregational chair cannot. The lead soprano in the choir cannot. But each of these individuals have been added to the local congregation to be built into a team that can win the victory with Jesus.

Verses 4–5: "For as in one body we have many members, and the members do not all have the same function, so we, though many, are one body in Christ, and individually members one of another." In baseball, the pitcher pitches. The catcher catches. The hitter hits. When a pitcher attempts to hit, the result is usually not very pretty. Catchers often do not excel at running the bases. The hitter usually does not do well when they are sent to the mound to pitch. Every member of the Body of Christ has a unique set of abilities and functions. Not everyone preaches. Not everyone leads. Not everyone sings well. Yet when the congregation assembles together as a team, it can succeed in ways unattainable by the individual.

Verses 6–8: "Having gifts that differ according to the grace given to us, let us use them: if prophecy, in proportion to our faith; if service, in our serving; the one who teaches, in his teaching; the one who exhorts, in his exhortation; the one who contributes, in generosity; the one who leads, with zeal; the one who does acts of mercy, with cheerfulness." Each member of the team has a role to play. Abilities and opportunities are entrusted to the individual members of the Body of Christ to be used for the ultimate purpose of stewarding the Gospel for the glory of God and the benefit of the neighbor. The one preaching is no more or less important than the others. The one serving or the one teaching, the leader or the merciful one — all are equally important in the faithful stewardship of all that the Lord has entrusted to the Body of Christ. All this stewardship is for the sake of the other!

A baseball team can have five All-Star pitchers but cannot win if the hitters do not hit. The best lineup in the league will struggle if the pitchers cannot get anyone on the other team out. Pitchers need the defense behind them to play well. Coaches need to lead well. When they all work together, you have a winning baseball team. When the Body of Christ has all its members faithfully stewarding the unique individual talents that have been entrusted to them, the victory goes to Jesus! This is the goal of faithful stewardship! It is all about Jesus!
