Dispatches from The Office

LEAD ME TO CHRIST, THE ROCK

“. . . Lead me to the rock that is higher than I, . . . *and the Rock was Christ.*” (Ps 61:2b; 1 Cor 10:4c, ESV)

Our 2025-2026 church and school theme is “*Lead Me to Christ, the Rock,*” from Psalm 61.2 and 1 Corinthians 10.4. With this theme we will explore the various ways in which Christ is the foundation of a holy and purposeful life.

Since this edition of *The Epistle* is published in early August, it is my first public teaching under this year’s theme, and an account from the *Book of Acts* immediately comes to mind. . .

Philip and the Ethiopian Eunuch

²⁶ Now an angel of the Lord said to Philip, “Rise and go toward the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza.” This is a desert place. ²⁷ And he rose and went. And there was an Ethiopian, a eunuch, a court official of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, who was in charge of all her treasure. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸ and was returning, seated in his chariot, and he was reading the prophet Isaiah. ²⁹ And the Spirit said to Philip, “Go over and join this chariot.” ³⁰ So Philip ran to him and heard him reading Isaiah the prophet and asked, “Do you understand what you are reading?” ³¹ And he said, “How can I, unless someone guides me?” And he invited Philip to come up and sit with him. ³² Now the passage of the Scripture that he was reading was this:

“Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb before its shearer is silent, so he opens not his mouth. ³³ In his humiliation justice was denied him. Who can describe his generation? For his life is taken away from the earth.” [Isa 53.7-8]

³⁴ And the eunuch said to Philip, “About whom, I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?” ³⁵ Then Philip opened his mouth, and beginning with this Scripture he told him the good news about Jesus. ³⁶ And as they were going along the road they came to some water, and the eunuch said, “See, here is water! What prevents me from being baptized?” ³⁸ And he commanded the chariot to stop, and they both went down into the water, Philip and the eunuch, and he baptized him. ³⁹ And when they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord carried Philip away, and the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing. ⁴⁰ But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he passed through he preached the gospel to all the towns until he came to Caesarea. (Acts 8:26–40 (ESV))

Philip the evangelist exemplifies what this year’s theme is all about: being led—and leading people—to Christ through His Word.

The treasurer for the Queen of Ethiopian was on his way back home after worshipping (as a Gentile) in the Temple precincts. He was reading from Isaiah, and then Philip did as Jesus did during His whole ministry: help people see how He was the fulfillment of the Scriptures (See Mt 5.17), leading them to repentance and faith in Him.

Clearly, we have a summary of what happened, for as Philip and the Ethiopian were in the chariot, Philip was teaching, and they most certainly talked about the gift of Baptism and its place—in many respects—as the New Testament fulfillment of and replacement for circumcision. Indeed, it is even more. “[*God*] *saves us by this washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, whom he pours out generously through Jesus Christ, our Savior, so that having been justified by His grace, we might become heirs and have the hope of eternal life.*” (Titus 3.5-8) Thus, having received The LORD’s teaching through Philip, with his heart opened by the Holy Spirit, the eunuch saw water and asked to be Baptized. We are told that after his Baptism, the eunuch “went on his way rejoicing.” This was part of the beginning of the Christian Church in Ethiopia, and it serves as a model for us in the purpose of Christ’s mission and the mystery of how that proceeds. . .

The LORD teaches us by His Word. Faithful catechists (teachers of the faith) lead us to Christ, the rock of faith. They open the Scriptures to us so that we see Christ as the fulfillment of the Old Testament and the content the New, the final sacrifice for sin, God -in-the-flesh, the Savior of the whole world. Through faithful teaching of the Scriptures we are led to repentance, to place our trust for life and salvation in Christ alone, and to rejoice in Christ’s sacraments and the life of faith.

At St. Paul’s we know *Christ in all things*. We know our mission is really God’s mission, and that it is a mission of grace, so we say that mission is *receiving and giving the love and hope of Christ*. He is “the rock of our salvation.” This year, in Church and School, let’s dig into God’s Word, that we may know Christ—and as He gives us opportunity—lead others to Christ, the Rock, that they may have true *life* in His Name. Lives and eternities are changed for the better through knowing Christ and His Word.
