Sing, Pray, and Keep His Ways Allison Mackie, Director of Parish Music

It seems that we have all had a difficult few months. The news cycle is filled with increasing stories of violence and murder, which are followed by endless arguments about which side was really at fault for causing this, and all of us are left feeling angrier and more isolated than ever. Every day

it seems like it is more difficult to get students to participate in class, and everyone I know has been more easily overwhelmed and irritated.

If we look throughout history, we can see that every generation has had their trials. I often find comfort in the words of hymns that saints who have gone before us have left behind. Flipping through names of hymn writers will reveal people who have lived through war, famine, plague, poverty, grief, and every kind of hardship imaginable.

One of these hymn writers is Georg Neumark, who lived in Germany during the Thirty Years' War, a conflict that devastated large parts of Europe. He wrote the hymn, "If Thou But Trust in God to Guide Thee," (LSB 750) after being robbed of all his money and personal possessions while traveling to university, which left him homeless and unemployed.

The hymn points to his faith in God throughout this difficult period in his life, and leaves us with comforting words for facing our own struggles. The text of the hymn makes clear that Neumark trusted that God was in control throughout his difficulties, and that Jesus has already crushed our real enemy. It also shows how we respond to life's difficulties - not by continuing pointless arguments, getting revenge, or giving up in despair, but by putting our hope and trust in God. Our temporary struggles may not work out the way we desire, but we know that God has the ultimate victory and will raise us to everlasting life with Him.

If thou but trust in God to guide thee
And hope in Him through all thy ways,
He'll give thee strength, whate'er betide thee,
And bear thee through the evil days.
Who trusts in God's unchanging love
Builds on the rock that naught can move.

Sing, pray, and keep His ways unswerving,
Perform thy duties faithfully,
And trust His Word; though undeserving,
Thou yet shalt find it true for thee.
God never yet forsook in need
The soul that trusted Him indeed. (LSB 750, stanzas 1 and 7)

Managing Disappointment and Pressing Forward

"Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing." (James 1:2–4, ESV)

When someone experiences a minor disappointment it's common for me to say, "Count it all joy!" In small things, that's my way of attempting to keep things faith-focused and light-hearted. It's not something I'd say at the death of a parent or some life-altering event. In situations like those, for example, when someone has just suffered a miscarriage, people—searching for something to say—may try and be pious and blurt, "It's all part of God's plan." In those situations, such "pieties" come across as unfeeling and even cruel. In disappointment, as The LORD tells us, there's ". . . a time to keep silence, and a time to speak." (Ecclesiastes 3:7, ESV)

Thus, since the last Friday in August, I've found myself having to repeat, "Count it all joy" to myself quite a bit. I was very excited because in June 2023 the congregation granted me a sabbatical—an extended time for rest a spiritual renewal—for summer 2026. We were not able to fund the sabbatical because of some necessary hiring decisions, but those of us involved in the pastoral sabbatical project were quietly hopeful that it would all work out. With great vigor and personal effort, Congregational President, Dan Eifert, and then-Head Elder, Dave Meyer, and I (also with the help of my wife) drafted a grant proposal to the Lilly Endowment that would enable me to make the writer's trip of a lifetime and have the congregation fully supported with pastoral care during the sabbatical. My wife, who writes a lot of grant proposals for Lilly, thought that our proposal was well done. I'd read other proposals that were funded and also thought that ours was every bit as good . . . but on the last business day of August I got the "Sorry, but you didn't get the grant" email.

I had told myself not to expect the grant, but I knew it was good, and I was very hopeful. It really would have been the trip of a lifetime . . . and it may yet be—but it will be different than I planned, and a lot of work to bring to completion. I will have to work a lot harder to acquire adequate funding to get to a place for extended solitude and exploration and the completion of my novel. The LORD will need to provide for pastoral support in my absence, even as St. Paul's makes the necessary steps back to a balanced budget. What I had hoped would be a long, itinerant writer's trip in a small

camper van may now have to be an extended stay at a gracious friend's unoccupied summer home, and that's OK. A great adventure up the Pacific Coast Highway with my wife may not happen, at least the way we envisioned, but we'll do an adventure of some kind together, and that's an important part of my sabbatical.

As the aphorism goes, "Man proposes; God disposes," and it is so. As I also like to say, "We pray, 'God's will be done,' and then we have to live by it." My not getting the dreamed-of grant for the writer's trip of a lifetime is, in the "big picture," a minor disappointment. It is nothing compared to a life-changing health diagnosis, the death of a loved one, or persecution for sake of Christ—which is the likely context of "Count it all joy when you meet trials of various kinds" in James 1. But I would by lying if I didn't admit that I was quite disappointed, even though I know all the above things. (Here I am writing about it, attempting to teach you even as I learn it myself.)

We manage disappointment and "press on toward the upward call of Christ" (Phil 3.14), in part, by remembering that God's will is done, (Mt 6.10) that we are God's beloved children, (1 Jn 3.2), and that, "of first importance" is that Jesus died and rose for our sins. (1 Cor 15.3-4) We also manage disappointments by having the courage to lament our troubles and disappointments in faith, as David (in the psalms) and Solomon (in *Ecclesiastes*) and Jeremiah (in his prophecy and in *Lamentations*), and—above all—as Jesus (in the garden and on the cross) exemplify for us. We also manage disappointments by "bearing with one another in love." (Eph 4.2) I thank Dave and Dan and my wife, Carrie, in particular, for bearing with me in love this last month, for buoying me and encouraging me to press on toward my goal. I guess that's what brought on this "dispatch from The Office." I have been encouraged by others. I encourage you all to keep your eyes and ears of faith open to your fellow members, friends, and neighbors, that—whether in small disappoints or great trials—you may do for them as others have done—and are doing—for me.

October's Hymn of the Month: The Strong Word

Our hymn of the month for October is "Thy Strong Word" (number 578 in *Lutheran Service Book).*

This is a relatively new hymn, first written by Professor Martin Franzmann for Concordia Seminary St. Louis's commencement ceremony in 1955. Franzmann chose to base the text on the seminary's motto, "Light from above."

Light is used in powerful imagery throughout the hymn, which starts at the beginning. God speaks light into existence at Creation. Jesus brings the light of salvation to sinners lost in darkness. The light of Jesus' righteousness shines upon us from the cross and gives us the ability to praise God without end. The final stanza uses images of light to reflect each person of the Trinity: God the Father has created light and all things, Jesus is the light of the world who brings us salvation, and the Holy Spirit reveals the light of the Gospel to us.

As we prepare to celebrate the anniversary of the Reformation at the end of October, stand firm in God Word, through which the light of the Gospel shines in our lives.
