Lord's Cupboard Thanksgiving food bags

We are very thankful for all the donations of food, money, time and energy from everyone who helped in one way or another. Because of your generosity with your time, talent and treasure, we were blessed to provide food to 240+ households this Thanksgiving! Most received a Thanksgiving meal food bag (172 bags), a turkey (50) or a gift card (some only a gift card). That is approximately 650+ people that knew St. Paul's is here to make their life a little easier and better. On our pantry distribution evening, 11/17, which was our busiest yet for a Thanksgiving pantry night, we had 98 households (part of the 240) given food and 230 to go meals (turkey, mashed potatoes and gravy, stuffing and a vegetable). LC is grateful, thankful and blessed!

Lord's Cupboard Christmas food bags

Lord's Cupboard food pantry will be packing 175 Christmas food bags on Saturday, December 13th, at 9am in the Fellowship Hall. We are planning for it to take 1.5 hours. Families and friends are welcome to help setup, pack and cleanup.

The approximate cost for the Christmas food bag is \$15 plus the \$15 gift card (1-4 people in household) or \$30 gift card (for 5 or more in household) which we give them to purchase their own ham or turkey.

The Third Sunday in Advent: *Narcissism or Salvation?*December 14 –21, 2025

Narcissism or Salvation?

"The world" tells us to find comfort by "looking within ourselves." Unfortunately, what we find there often leads to despair. The true antidote for the anxious heart (Isa 35.4) can come only from outside ourselves. Eternal hope, help, and comfort comes from the LORD. (Ps 146.5) Though we wait with patience until the coming of the Lord, (Jms 5.7) God has shown us, in Christ, His eternal power. Though He seemed like the "least in the kingdom of heaven," He was, in fact, "the greatest." Those who have "ears to hear" (Mt 3.15) understand that what is true of Christ is also true of His beloved.



The Third Sunday in Advent Old Testament Reading: Isaiah 35:1-10

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad; the desert shall rejoice and blossom like the crocus; it shall blossom abundantly and rejoice with joy and singing. The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God. Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees. Say to those who have an anxious heart, "Be strong; fear not! Behold, your God will come with vengeance, with the recompense of God. He will come and save you." Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then shall the lame man leap like a deer, and the tongue of the mute sing for joy. For waters break forth in the wilderness, and streams in the desert; the burning sand shall become a pool, and the thirsty ground springs of water; in the haunt of jackals, where they lie down, the grass shall become reeds and rushes. And a highway shall be there, and it shall be called the Way of Holiness; the unclean shall not pass over it. It shall belong to those who walk on the way; even if they are fools, they shall not go astray. No lion shall be there, nor shall any ravenous beast come up on it; they shall not be found there, but the redeemed shall walk there. And the ransomed of the Lord shall return and come to Zion with singing; everlasting joy shall be upon their heads; they shall obtain gladness and joy, and sorrow and sighing shall flee away.

Epistle: James 5:7-11

Be patient, therefore, brothers, until the coming of the Lord. See how the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth, being patient about it, until it receives the early and the late rains. You also, be patient. Establish your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is at hand. Do not grumble against one another, brothers, so that you may not be judged; behold, the Judge is standing at the door.

As an example of suffering and patience, brothers, take the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord. Behold, we consider those blessed who remained steadfast. You have heard of the steadfastness of Job, and you have seen the purpose of the Lord, how the Lord is compassionate and merciful.

Holy Gospel: Matthew 11:2-15

When John heard in prison about the deeds of the Christ, he sent word by his disciples and said to him, "Are you the one who is to come, or shall we look for another?" And Jesus answered them, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised up, and the poor have good news preached to them. And blessed is the one who is not offended by me."

As they went away, Jesus began to speak to the crowds concerning John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed shaken by the wind? What then did you go out to see? A man dressed in soft clothing? Behold, those who wear soft clothing are in kings' houses. What then did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is he of whom it is written,

"Behold, I send my messenger before your face, who will prepare your way before you.'

Truly, I say to you, among those born of women there has arisen no one greater than John the Baptist. Yet the one who is least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he. From the days of John the Baptist until now the kingdom of heaven has suffered violence, and the violent take it by force. For all the Prophets and the Law prophesied until John, and if you are willing to accept it, he is Elijah who is to come. He who has ears to hear, let him hear."

If you are physically unable to come forward, please let an usher know and the pastor will come to you and give you communion. Those communing should mark this on the attendance card. If you have questions, our pastors will be pleased to speak with you.

Distribution and Communion Wine

Please place open hands out to receive the Body of Christ and also to indicate whether you are receiving the Blood of Christ from the common cup or the individual cup. Introduction

In 1993, 83 percent of 12th grade girls said they wanted to get married someday; this dropped to 61 percent 30 years later. The boys barely budged, maintaining nearly identical views [at over 70%) over the same three decades. (Daniel Cox, "Much Ado About Marriage." 11/27/2025. www.americansurveycenter.org.)

We asked [young adult] participants to tell us what their ideal life looks like right now. Few of these young singles mentioned that marriage and family were important. We then asked them to tell us what their ideal life would be 30 years from now. Incredibly, many said that being surrounded by loving family members and grandkids was how they saw themselves living their best lives in the future. The findings suggest that young adults are aware of the personal benefits of family later in life but fail to understand how this future result requires present-day investments.
