Can I Really Make a Difference?

We read and study the stories of great people, in the Bible and elsewhere, but—for many of us—those are “other people.” Most of us look at ourselves and see insignificance. Can I really make a difference? The conversion of St. Paul (Acts 9.1-12) and his ministry (see Gal 1.11-24) and the clear teaching of Jesus (see Mt 19.27-30) beg us to reconsider what is truly important and transformative for us and for the whole world. (see Ps 67).

Son of God, Eternal Savior (Pastor O'Donnell)

In the face of dangers—physical or spiritual—our natural inclination is “do it ourselves.” That’s often a mistake in physical danger; it’s an eternal disaster in spiritual matters. Thus, we are best to read Jesus’ “Beatitudes” (Mt 5.1-12) less as a prescription for us than a description of Him. Indeed, to “do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God” (Mic 6.8) is, Scripturally, not a matter of our doing, but God’s doing, for the gift of God is that Jesus Christ is our “wisdom from God, righteousness and sanctification and redemption, so that, as it is written, ‘Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord.’” (1 Cor 1.30-31)

God's Little Learners at Work and Play!

In 4K, students do a variety of play-based learning, project-based learning, and hand-on learning. By getting to learn in a variety of ways, students develop many skills that they will take with them as they grow older. Some of these skills are cognitive skills, motor skills, communication skills, social skills, emotional and self-regulation skills, creativity and executive functioning skills.

One of the ways 4K gets to practice role-playing real world experiences is in the dramatic play center. This center changes usually every month or two. This play center started off as a pumpkin patch and is now a gingerbread house. Students can come and go to this play center. During this time, students can do imaginary play to buy something, shop for something, eat something, bake something, and so much more. These times of learning also remind students that while they are playing with one another, they get the special opportunity to share God's love with one another.



Another way students learn is by getting to experience classroom transformations. For our Christmas party, 4K got to travel on the Polar Express! The classroom got transformed into a train station. Each student got to decorate their own train conductor hat to wear on the train. They then got their train ticket punched so they were all set to board the Polar Express. Once they boarded the train, hot cocoa and popcorn was ready for them to eat. On the Polar Express, the class watched a short movie. Lastly, each student got to take home a souvenir from their trip on the Polar Express.

The Conversion of St. Paul

First Reading: Acts 9:1-22

But Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any belonging to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he went on his way, he approached Damascus, and suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. And falling to the ground he heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?" And he said, "Who are you, Lord?" And he said, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But rise and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." The men who were traveling with him stood speechless, hearing the voice but seeing no one. Saul rose from the ground, and although his eyes were opened, he saw nothing. So they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. And for three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

Now there was a disciple at Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, "Ananias." And he said, "Here I am, Lord." And the Lord said to him, "Rise and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul, for behold, he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight." But Ananias answered, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints at Jerusalem. And here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who call on your name." But the Lord said to him, "Go, for he is a chosen instrument of mine to carry my name before the Gentiles and kings and the children of Israel. For I will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name." So Ananias departed and entered the house. And laying his hands on him he said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus who appeared to you on the road by which you came has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and he regained his sight. Then he rose and was baptized; and taking food, he was strengthened.

For some days he was with the disciples at Damascus. And immediately he proclaimed Jesus in the synagogues, saying, "He is the Son of God." And all who heard him were amazed and said, "Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem of those who called upon this name? And has he not come here for this

purpose, to bring them bound before the chief priests?" But Saul increased all the more in strength, and confounded the Jews who lived in Damascus by proving that Jesus was the Christ.

Epistle: Galatians 1:11-24

For I would have you know, brothers, that the gospel that was preached by me is not man's gospel. For I did not receive it from any man, nor was I taught it, but I received it through a revelation of Jesus Christ. For you have heard of my former life in Judaism, how I persecuted the church of God violently and tried to destroy it. And I was advancing in Judaism beyond many of my own age among my people, so extremely zealous was I for the traditions of my fathers. But when he who had set me apart before I was born, and who called me by his grace, was pleased to reveal his Son to me, in order that I might preach him among the Gentiles, I did not immediately consult with anyone; nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those who were apostles before me, but I went away into Arabia, and returned again to Damascus.

Then after three years I went up to Jerusalem to visit Cephas and remained with him fifteen days. But I saw none of the other apostles except James the Lord's brother. (In what I am writing to you, before God, I do not lie!) Then I went into the regions of Syria and Cilicia. And I was still unknown in person to the churches of Judea that are in Christ. They only were hearing it said, "He who used to persecute us is now preaching the faith he once tried to destroy." And they glorified God because of me.


Then Peter said in reply, "See, we have left everything and followed you. What then will we have?" Jesus said to them, "Truly, I say to you, in the new world, when the Son of Man will sit on his glorious throne, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or children or lands, for my name's sake, will receive a hundredfold and will inherit eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and the last first."

HOLY COMMUNION

The Lord's Supper is not a private meal, but a body-and-soul communion with Christ and His body, the Church. In keeping with the Lord's instruction (cf. 1 Corinthians 11.17-34) and with the common historical practice of the church, St. Paul's welcomes only those who are in full confessional agreement to receive the Body and Blood of Christ. If you hold a confession differing from The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod or are not yet confirmed in our confession of faith, we welcome you to come forward for a blessing (Please indicate by folding your hands over your heart.). If you are physically unable to come forward, please let an usher know and the pastor will come to you and give you communion. Those communing should mark this on the attendance card. If you have questions, our pastors will be pleased to speak with you.

Distribution and Communion Wine

Please place open hands out to receive the Body of Christ and also to indicate whether you are receiving the Blood of Christ from the common cup or the individual cup. 
